# Wholesale power costs increasing

**THE TOPIC FOR** this column will not be a popular one, but it is important. The cost of wholesale power Santee Electric purchases is going up significantly, and this will cause the energy charge we pass on to you to increase by 1 cent per kilowatt-hour (kWh). This is not what you want to read and not what I want to write, but I will explain why and what this means for the average power bill.

There is no question that the cost of everything is going up. The cost of the poles, wires, transformers, trucks and meters we use has gone up significantly in the past five years. However, SEC has taken every cost-cutting measure possible to keep from passing these costs on to you. I am proud to say we have succeeded in absorbing those costs to date.

What we are not able to absorb is a significant increase in the cost of the wholesale power that we buy to distribute throughout our system. You are likely aware that your cooperative does not generate electricity. Rather, we purchase electricity at the wholesale level and distribute it to our members. What you may not know is that roughly 25% of that wholesale power comes from Duke Energy while the rest comes from Santee Cooper. We have seen gradual increases from Duke over the past several years, and we have so far been able to absorb those costs as well. However, Santee Cooper is emerging from a rate lock period with a significant increase for all its customers, including the state's cooperatives. This subject has been covered a great deal in the media and on Santee Cooper's website, so I will not rehash it here.

I want to make one thing clear. I am not blaming Santee Cooper for the increase in the energy charge of Santee Electric Cooperative (as always, I apologize for the confusing, similar names). However, because our wholesale power costs make up 70% of our total costs, and because the Santee Cooper portion is three-fourths of that amount, this latest cost increase ends up being more than we can absorb. Again, it is not the sole reason, just the final straw.

Our base residential energy charge is still 6.5 cents per kWh, but our wholesale power cost adjustment factor (which has been zero or negative for years) is now 1 cent. The residential demand component for the bill is not increasing, just the energy portion. For a 1,000-kWh bill, this amounts to a \$10 increase. We do not take this lightly.

I want you to know we have done everything we could to postpone the inevitable. Changing our rate structure, reducing offices, managing labor costs and many other initiatives have all put downward pressure on rates. At some point, though, there is nowhere else to trim.

- A student can only receive this scholarship one time. It's not renewable.
- The scholarship monies can be used by undergraduate students to attend, on a full-time basis, any university/college.
- Only high school seniors with a "C" average or better may apply.
- Selected applicants will be required to provide SEC with an official transcript and acceptance letter to verify their eligibility.
