REPRESENTATIVE ROGER KIRBY has always had a strong desire to serve his community. As he embarks on his sixth term in the South Carolina House of Representatives, he feels honored. He understands the responsibility that comes with serving his constituents. He believes bringing the rural perspective to the State House is crucial, and he is optimistic about the future of his community.

Why did you go into public service?

I believe we are called to serve a public good and a higher purpose. We owe that to our society. So, when I had an opportunity arise to make a difference in our communities, I knew that was something I wanted to do.

I began in public service almost 28 years ago. I had the chance to serve on the Florence County Planning Commission and the Florence County Transportation Commission for 16 years. Then the opportunity came for me to run for the South Carolina House in 2014 and I have been fortunate to serve ever since.

What's the most satisfying part of your role? The most challenging?

There is a lot of reward in helping people with issues they do not know how to navigate. Politics is local. We deal with things that cover a larger area of influence of course (at the State House), but our primary focus is on our constituents back home. We represent them and their interests.

Scranton Industrial Park is something that we have supported throughout the process of building. Some other things are the infrastructure expansions in water, sewer and roads in Williamsburg and Florence counties. The federal dollars we have been given have enabled this.
